English

Don't forget to read every day. If you finish a book and you think other children in the class will enjoy it, please write a short book review on Purple Mash.

When you are reading, note down any unfamiliar words and explore the meanings of these words by using a dictionary.

Make repeated pattern prints for decorative purposes using natural materials, e.g potato printing, or create some still life observational sketches of fruit. Look at the artwork of Giuseppe Arcimboldo and you could maybe recreate some of his paintings with fruit.
