

Maths - Revisiting Angles: Angles on a Straight Line

Today, you are going to be looking at angles on a straight line. This will remind you of the learning you need to know before we move on to some new year 6 learning.

There is a teaching slides document in Google Classroom called, '23.04.20 Revisiting Angles.' Go through this first, drawing the angles that it asks you to, before going on to the next slide to check how accurate your estimations were.

Then, you need to do the sheet in Google Classroom which is called, 'Calculating angles on a straight line.' You can't write on the sheet, you will need to write your answers on paper. I have also uploaded the questions. The second sheet is harder than the first - don't worry if you can't answer them all. The important thing that you need to remember is this:



Angles on a straight line always add up to 180 degrees. Look at this picture to help you understand. You will need to work out what needs to be added to the angles you already know to make 180.

The other thing to remember is: when there is a missing value and it is represented by a letter (such as 'a') all of the missing angles marked 'a' will be the same number as they are worth the same.

English - Investigating an inspirational person

Thank you for the work lots of you put into your biographies yesterday. They were great! Lots of them really made me smile.

Today, you need to research one well-known person who could be described as being inspirational. You will be



using this information to write a biography of them next week. Examples of inspirational people are: Greta Thunberg, David Attenborough, Martin Luther King, Kobe Bryant or Ghandi. You don't need to pick one of these though, you can pick your own. You can use the famous person who you wrote about on Monday if you would like to.

You need to find out lots about them such as: Where and when they were born, who their family were, the main events in their life, why they are famous, the problems they had to overcome, why they inspire people, who inspired them.

You could also write down some quotes that they have said or that others have said about them. The 'features of a biography' sheet is on Google Classroom if it helps.

You can write what you find out down in your jotter, type it onto a Google Doc or create a mind map like the ones we often do in class. It is entirely up to you how you gather and write your information. I don't need to see it, so don't worry if you can't share it with me.

Geography: Comparing a region of North America to a region in the UK. Yesterday, you should have started a piece of work that compared and contrasted an area of North America with an area near us. Today, you need to try and get this finished. If you have already finished, go back and check there is nothing more that you can add, thinking about the questions that were on yesterday's timetable. Have you included things like pictures, photos and maps? Is it eye-catching as well as interesting? Don't forget, I love to see photos of your work.
