## History: Investigating an inspirational figure from British history

For your history learning today, you are going to be finding out all about an important man from British history: William Wilberforce. He played an important role in helping to abolish (put an end to) the slave trade.



To start, you need to carefully read the slides that are in Google Classroom: 'History - William Wilberforce Slides.' When you have read all of the information you have three options:

1. **You can create a poster to persuade people living at the time of William Wilberforce that the slave trade should be abolished.** You will need to include information and pictures that explain persuasively why it was such an awful thing and the impact it had on people.
2. **You can write a persuasive speech in role as William Wilberforce.** Imagine that you are standing in front of a crowd of MP's who don't think the slave trade should end. What would you say to persuade them?
3. **You can create a poster/piece of writing/Google Slides explaining what you have found out about William Wilberforce and the slave trade.** This could include writing, pictures, maps and lots of interesting facts.
