#### Weekly Focus: Division

- PurpleMash:
- 1. Select the most appropriate division statement for each array.
- 2. Select the appropriate division statement correlating to the model.

### Multiplication/Division Word Problems

- Can you share 20 giraffes between 5 fields equally?
- Can you share 35 giraffes between 5 fields equally?
- Can you share 22 leaves between 2 giraffes equally? How many leaves would they get each?
- There are 18 leaves on a tree. They are shared fairly between 2 giraffes. How many leaves does each giraffe get?
- A giraffe has 4 legs. How many legs would 5 giraffes have altogether?
- A giraffe has 4 legs. How many legs would 2 giraffes have altogether?

Think about how to answer these questions. Do you want to use an object for each giraffe and share them out? Do you want to draw a picture? Can you




write a number sentence and use your mental maths e.g. 20 ÷ 5 = ?


- Practise sharing into equal groups with this <u>online game</u>.

- Answer the following questions about the story:

- 2. Why did the cricket believe that Gerald could dance?
- 3. What helpful advice did the cricket give to Gerald?
- 4. When did Gerald start believing that he could dance?
- 5. Which is your favourite animal from this story and why?
- Enjoy this online story: <u>'Ginger the</u>
   <u>Giraffe</u>. Can you write 5 questions for
   an adult to answer about this story or
   <u>Giraffes Can't Dance?</u>
- Find out all about giraffes in Africa by reading this <u>non-fiction text</u>. This will help you with your writing tasks.
- Complete the book review 2do on <u>Purple Mash</u> for your favourite book from this week.

### Writing Tasks

- Make your own non-fiction book about giraffes! Each page should have a heading, a few facts and a picture. Here are some ideas:
  - Giraffe Babies
  - Drinking and Eating
  - Habitat
  - o Patterns, Hooves and Horns

How many pages can you add to your book? This can be done on the giraffe 2do on <u>PurpleMash</u>. Remember to write in full sentences and always proofread your work for mistakes before submitting.

- You may want to write sentences with a list of objects in your giraffe book e.g. 'Giraffes eat leaves, seeds, fruits and buds. Complete the Making Lists 2do on <u>PurpleMash</u>.
- Look at this acrostic poem about butterflies. Write your own acrostic poem about giraffes. This can be done on the acrostic poem 2do on PurpleMash.

### Learning Project

Science - Make your own <u>'giraffe skin' patterns</u>. Do you know what is happening to the colours when you dip them in the water? Have a go at making different combinations of colours. You can also use this method to <u>grow a rainbow!</u>



**Art** - Make a giraffe collage using scraps of paper or bits from packaging. Be creative and purposely choose different colours for your background and giraffe!



D.T. - Can you make a giraffe out of recycled lollipop sticks? Using your knowledge of different types of glue (from when we made our Fire of London houses), what would be the best way to stick them together? You may need a grown up to help you shape the sticks for the head and tail.



**Geography** - Label the features of Africa on the <u>PurpleMash</u> 2do. You may need an atlas or to do some research to help you!
