Maths - Multiple Choice Word Problems

For maths today, you have a variety of problems to solve which will involve you using your addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills. They are multiple choice (there are four possible answers listed for each one) so you will know immediately if you are wrong as the answer won't be listed! Questions 4 and 10 are new learning so you don't need to do these questions. **YOU DO NOT HAVE TO DO ALL OF THE QUESTIONS AND YOU DO NOT HAVE TO DO THEM IN ORDER.** Aim to do at least 15; look through the questions to see which ones you think you could have a go at. Don't be put off by the amount of information that there is in each problem. Keep checking back to the question to remind

yourself what it is that you need to do. Most of all - persevere! Don't just pick the ones that are easy to answer. If you are not challenging yourself you are not learning!

English - Writing a story

Yesterday, you planned a story, thinking about what was happening to the main character at every major plot point. Today, you need to bring your character to life in his/her story! How will you know you have been successful? By checking your work against the following list!

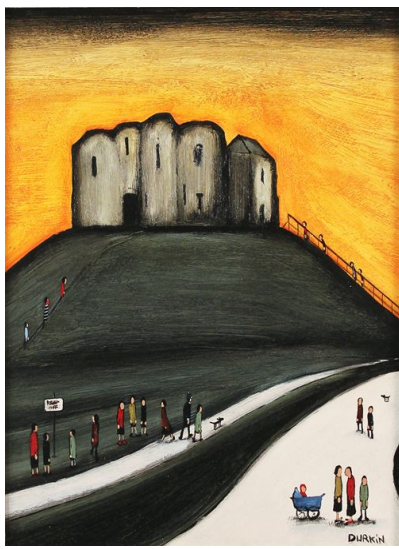
Don't tell me the moon is shining; show me the glint of light on broken glass.

- I have written a story based around the actions, thoughts and feelings of the main character.
- I have included descriptions of the setting and main character that feature techniques such as similes, personification and metaphors.
- I have used exciting verbs that help to paint a better picture for the reader.
- I have tried to show not tell. (Don't write, 'He was incredibly angry.' Write, 'Like a tornado, he tore through the room knocking chairs to the floor. His eyes were full of fire whilst his whole body quivered with rage.')
- I have written a story that I would like to read.

Stories can take a long time to write, so it might be that you choose to just write one part of the story. This could be the beginning, the middle or the end. There is an assignment in Google Classroom for you to type on.

Please remember - if something is worth doing, it is worth doing well! You get better at writing by trying to get better at writing, not by doing the minimum!



Art - Creating a piece of art featuring Clifford's Tower

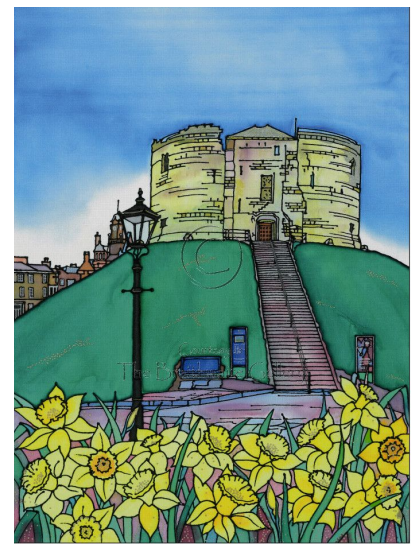

Geography: Planning a trip to York!

At the moment, we can't go and visit many places, but today you are going to imagine you are heading to York for a day out! York is a hugely popular tourist destination, with an amazing 6.9 million people visiting the city each year, spending a total of £564 million. (How lucky are we, that we live so close to a place that nearly 7 million people want to come and see!)

There are so many things to see and do in York; some of you may already have visited lots of them. Today, you need to plan a day trip to York. You need to think about these things:

- How are you going to get there?

However, not only do you need to plan your trip, you need to calculate how much your day out is going to cost. For example, if you are going by train, you need to find out the approximate cost of the ticket, if you are going to the Jorvik Centre, you need to go on their website and find out how much it will cost to get in. You will have to ask the adults in your house to help you out with the approximate cost of your meals, or you could go on the restaurant's website and look at the menus.
