Our Vision

Rooted in Christian belief, our vision for every member of this school community is to feel valued and respected, regardless of age, gender, sexuality, race, faith, belief or ability. Through developing a love of learning, each individual will have the opportunity to reach their full potential and aspire to become the person they were born to be.

Rationale

Our Collective Worship Policy strengthens and supports the Christian identity of our school, reaffirms our vision and associated values of thankfulness, perseverance, forgiveness and respect and celebrates the central role that each child has to play in their community. Our worship reflects the variety of traditions found in the Church of England, and will recognise and follow the Christian liturgical year. The daily Christian act of worship is central to our ethos and is supported by all staff and governors. It makes an important contribution to the overall spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of the whole school community.

Therefore Collective Worship at Kirk Fenton Church of England Primary School is planned:

- To be inspirational and inclusive. It should engage all learners and they should be able to talk about the impact it makes on their relationships and on life in the school
- To regularly include biblical material and Christian teaching and this should explore and relate to the school's core Christian values.
- To have a strong focus on God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit enabling all learners to embark on an understanding of the Trinity
- To help all learners to understand Anglican and other Christian traditions found in the UK and worldwide
- To challenge all learners of all backgrounds to understand and embark on their own spiritual journey. They should understand the value of prayer, reflection and stillness
- To contribute significantly to pupils' spiritual, moral and cultural development; by providing all learners with something more than the obvious, something to wonder at and something to respond to.
- To be an opportunity to celebrate and give thanks for achievements within the school, local and international community and occasions of significance, including festivals.

Collective worship should be invitational and an experience that does not offend the integrity of the non-religious or those of a different faith.

Legal Requirements

The law requires the Headteacher and Governing Body of every school to provide a daily act of Collective Worship which is in line with the school's Trust deed and foundation.

Withdrawal from Collective Worship

Parents have the right to withdraw their children from acts of worship and this is stated in the school prospectus and handbook. Parents would need to contact the Headteacher in this case and a meeting to arranged.

Planning Collective Worship

Specific time is set aside for Collective Worship and we recognise the importance of marking out the act of Collective Worship from other assembly activities. We attempt to mark this special time by lighting candles and saying a welcoming prayer or phrase.

Each person leading worship is expected to plan his or her act of worship with the same degree of thoroughness as any other aspect of their teaching practice. We encourage a five-stage structure of planning including

- Gathering
- Engaging (Windows)
- Reflecting (Mirrors)
- Responding (Doors)
- Sending

There should also be space for evaluation. A Worship Group meets termly to review and evaluate the last term's acts of Collective Worship and to plan themes for the next term. The views of pupils are sought through the school's Faith, Hope and Lunch group. Pupils are encouraged to be involved in the planning, leading and monitoring of Collective Worship.

One of the school's governors has a role in monitoring Collective Worship through membership of the Faith, Hope and Lunch group at the school. This is currently Reverend Simon Biddlestone.

There are a number of resources available to form the basis of collective worship planning. At Kirk Fenton CE Primary School we use 'Roots and Fruits' as a basis. We also have a weekly worship with a member of the clergy from our local community of churches.

Pattern of Collective Worship

Whole school worship is held daily at 09:30 on Tuesdays to Thursdays. This is taken by the Headteacher, a local ordained minister and a teacher

Key stage Worship is held at 9:30 on Mondays and is taken by teachers on a rota basis

Class worship is held on Fridays and is taken by the class teacher.

Acts of worship generally follow themes that are linked to the school's vision and values, British values and include the pattern of the church's year.

Visitors

Visitors should understand the educational aims of Collective Worship at the school. Attempts to persuade pupils to adopt a particular religious or non-religious belief are not appropriate. In general, the Headteacher is consulted before a visiting speaker is confirmed. Visitors should not speak about raising money for a particular cause without the prior permission of the Headteacher.

Monitoring and Evaluation

Our school regularly evaluates our acts of Collective Worship and the impact it has the school and its wides community. This involves monitoring by school leaders, staff, pupils and governors in order to grow and develop. We also welcome the contributions of parents and pupils through our suggestion boxes and questionnaires, which are reviewed on a regular basis. These are shared with our Local governing body and play an integral part in developing the spiritual growth of the school. Worship is independently inspected by law under Section 48 of the Education Act 2005 in consultation with the Diocese of York (SIAMS)
