Year 1 - Summer 1

Know odd and even numbers to 20

Count in 2s to 20 Count in 5s to 50 Count in 10s to 100

Children should be able to name the even numbers to 20 and explain that they can be shared equally into 2 groups. 2,4,6,8,10,12,14,16,18 and 20.

They should also be able to name the odd numbers 1,3,5,7,9,11,13,15,17,19.

Children should be able to count in 2s to 20 - 2,4,6,8,10,12,14,16,18,20.

They should be able to count in 5s to 50 - 5,10,15,20,25,30,35,40,45,50.

Finally, children should be able to count in 10s to 100. 10,20,30,40,50,60,70,80,90,100

Key Vocabulary

even odd multiple share equal

Things to try

- Line up toys or teddies in twos
- Investigate odd numbers by trying to share them into 2 groups fairly
- Look at house numbers on your street, odd are on one side and even numbers on the other.
- If you have a calendar on the wall, you could mark the odd and even numbers on your calendar so children start to understand.
- Play sorting games with number cards.
- Play on Numbots.
